



There are so many ways that you can make donations or pay for our range of merchandise.

Cash and cheques can be placed in the box by the main door, and credit card payments can be made in several ways:

- by scanning the QR code on the weekly pew sheet or the back of Rendezvous;



Rendezvous subscriptions for 2022 are now due

Subscriptions to Rendezvous run from January to December each year and payment for 2022 is now due. The **annual subscription rate for 2022 is £10**, which saves you £2 on the cost of 12 individual issues. If you have any questions about subscriptions or distribution, please contact Catriona Hunter, Distribution Coordinator. Her contact details are on the inside front cover of every issue of Rendezvous.

If you have your magazine delivered we will be asking your distributor to collect your payment this month, otherwise you can pick up your copies each month in church.

Payments to your distributor may be made by cash or cheque made out to Rendezvous Magazine (preferably in an envelope addressed to Catriona Hunter, Rendezvous Distribution Coordinator – but don't forget to include your name and address too). However, if you wish to pay by credit card you can do this in one of three ways: i. use the Donation Station in church; ii. use the Donate button on our website https://stmaryandsteanswythe.org; or iii. scan the QR code on the back cover of Rendezvous. Note that if paying by credit card it would help us enormously if you would let Catriona know that you have paid your subscription so that this money can be separated from general church funds.

If you pay by subscription but collect your own copy in church you can pay in any of the ways outlined above – envelopes containing cash or cheques can be placed in the donations box in church.

Covid Strategy

On 20th July our PCC made the following decisions about our church worship. Despite the relaxing of legal restrictions, we remain extremely concerned about the current rapid rise of Covid infections, and our strategy reflects this and was updated on December 11th.

- The common cup will not be reintroduced until Covid rates are low enough for Fr John T and I to feel safe to consume leftover wine.
- Presiding priests will continue to practice present hygiene protocols, with the use of masks, gel and gloves, and by keeping the ciborium covered during the Eucharistic Prayer.
- Presiding priests will not invite people to move to share the Peace physically with those not sitting near them.
- · Priests will not shake hands with people as they leave, because the risk of passing infections from person to person is too great.
- · We will invite those attending to continue to check in using the NHS app or our contact slips.
- The congregation must continue to practice social distancing in family and friendship groups, and to use face coverings and hand gel.
- · We will leave the seat cushions where they are to encourage social distancing.
- We will not reintroduce refreshments until the current high and rising infection rates persist.
- A crucifer will lead the procession and recession and Altar Servers may assist those Presiding priests who are happy for them to do so, but they must wear masks and gloves at all times.
- · We will communicate our expectations clearly through signage, notice sheets and announcements.
- We will not reintroduce a collection using offering bags or plates, or an offertory procession at this stage but donations can be made in the Donations Box or with a card at the Donation Station.
- We will reintroduce congregational singing on the condition that those who sing practise social distancing and wear face coverings. Singing will not be permitted in the pews at the back of the church, which will be reserved for those who feel unsafe singing.

We hope this makes sense to everyone, and we will review these strategies as we track the impact on the spread of Covid locally.


Jesus' Birthday Cake

On the first Sunday in December there was a buzz of excitement and expectancy as we gathered for our first Children's Church; the congregation and Fr John sent us off with a prayer to help us as we stirred up our Birthday Cakes for Jesus. Making Birthday Cakes for Jesus has its own traditions of course, and so we warmed up with the BC4J song (based loosely on the Hokey cokey) and a prayer. Thus prepared, we rolled up our sleeves and swarmed around the tables ready for the big stir up....

This was definitely not "Bake Off" but the two groups of children and adults showed terrific style as they added ingredients, cracked the eggs (not always quite where they were required!) and stirred, stirred, stirred!

As we added each ingredient we focussed on something important that we can learn about following Jesus – here is our recipe -

- © margarine (a kind word)
- © brown sugar (some sweetness)
- © eggs (new life which Jesus gives us)
- © flour (Jesus is a firm foundation for our lives)
- © mixed spice (Jesus is the spice of life)
- © dried fruit (the fruits of the Holy Spirit)

- © vanilla essence (the meaning of life)
- © a dash of brandy (the Spirit)

BOOKWORM

The Benefits of Passion – Catherine Fox (1997)

Well, you know how much I enjoy reading Catherine Fox's books about life in the Church of England, and this is one of her best as far as I'm concerned. It's one of her earlier works and there was the unexpected bonus that it featured some of the characters from Angels and Men.

The main character is Annie, an ordinand, who is writing a raunchy novel about (you guessed it) an ordinand. So this gives us two parallel plots: Barney and Isabella in Annie's novel, and Annie and her fellow ordinands. But the course of true love never runs smoothly. Neither for Annie nor Barney and Isabella. Being an ordinand is not easy either and Annie is struggling with her faith, her conscience, her mother, and life in general. Not to mention the men in her life. All of which makes for a very good read, full of humour and tears.

In fact I found the second half of the book almost unputdownable. There are several plot twists that you won't see coming, but I always think that's the best way. Read and enjoy. And it turns out that this is the middle of a trilogy, so I've still got another one to read.

Not a Happy Family – Shari Lapena (2021)

I can't believe that we went out for a meal with only 5 minutes of this book left to read! I was on tenterhooks all evening wanting to get to the end.

This is a book full of twists and turns and I really had no idea who the murderer was because at some stage I'd suspected everyone in this very dysfunctional family. It's a good read, even though it's not as fast paced as some of Shari Lapena's earlier works. The basic plot is about a very rich family. The father is a nasty bit of work and the mother a bit weak. Following a major row over an Easter meal the parents are brutally murdered, but the question is, who did it? There are so many people who have a motive, and everyone is lying to the police.

If you guess the identity of the murderer, I shall be very impressed.

Twas The Nightshift Before Christmas – Adam Kay (2019)

I read this whole book in a day, though before you get too impressed, it's only 142 pages.

Obviously it's aimed at the Christmas market, but that really made no difference at all. It's a very readable, very funny, but also tragic account of the six Christmases that junior doctor Adam Kay spent working in the NHS. He always seemed to draw the short straw and be on the rota for duty over Christmas and new year. Was this because he had no children? Or because he is Jewish? Who knows. But working in obstetrics, things carry on much as normal whether or not it's the festive season. If you've read his first book, This Is Going To Hurt, you'll know that an ultimately tragic event led him to leave medicine and he is now an award winning comedian and author. So although his work is laugh-out-loud-funny there is also a far more serious message not very far below the surface.


It's a great book though.

St Eanswythe, Patron Saint of Folkestone, Colouring Book



The choir at our church became affiliated to the School of English Church Music in 1929. The SECM was founded in 1927 by Sir Sydney Nicholson to encourage the best possible standards in music in worship. It says a great deal about the standard of music in worship in St Mary & St Eanswythe's at that time, as I believe choirs were assessed before being enrolled.

I can remember singing joint Evensongs at Lyminge, Hythe, Holy Trinity and each year in Canterbury Cathedral. On one memorable occasion, the whole choir went by coach to the RSCM's headquarters at Addington Palace having been invited to sing Evensong in the chapel there - the palace had once been the residence of Archbishops of Canterbury. The chapel was fairly small but was beautifully decorated in what I now know is the Palladian style with the most impressive wood carvings.

Having sung the service we disrobed and piled back onto the coach, which, after about 30 minutes, pulled into a large car park where we boys were set free to play whatever games we could think of and generally let off steam, whilst the gentlemen mysteriously disappeared into what we soon realised was a public house!

One occasion I particularly remember was being chosen with two other boys from our choir to join with trebles from across the country to sing at a special Evensong in St Paul's Cathedral, London conducted by Gerald Knight, RSCM director from 1954 –to 1972. We were allowed off school to attend rehearsal in London and on the day itself a large choir of boys processed into that huge cathedral where we sung our hearts out – what a privilege!

Know your Church The Chancel Sanctuary

The twelfth mosaic is of St Matthew. St Matthew, called Levi in St Mark and St Luke's Gospels was a tax collector. His fellow Jews would have regarded him as a traitor, gathering their money for the occupying Romans. He had probably made himself wealthy as well. St Luke's Gospel tells us that he held a banquet for Jesus. H was called to be a disciple when Jesus passed him in his tax booth near Capernaum on the Sea of Galilee.

After the Gospel accounts, it is thought that he preached and was then martyred. The manner of his martyrdom is also unclear - some accounts say it was a spear, other by a sword. But he is depicted in our mosaic with a spear. Some traditions say that Matthew was martyred in Ethiopia to the south of the Caspian Sea (not Ethiopia in



Africa), others say that he was martyred in Hierapolis of Parthia. According to Epiphanius, Bishop of Cyprus, Matthew was martyred in Hierapolis, and the Matthias who replaced Judas Iscariot among the Twelve is the one who died in Ethiopia.


His relics were carried to Campania, in the Diocese of Capaccio. Retrieved by Lombards, they were moved to Salerno, where they are currently kept in the Cathedral's crypt

Matthew is recognised as a saint in both the Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches. The Eastern Orthodox celebrate his feast day on November 16, whereas September 21 is observed in Catholic churches.

The mosaic was given by The Misses Lowder in memory of Charles F Lowder.



The central mosaic in the Chancel Reredos, the final mosaic in our series, is of Angels Censing. Like the mosaics of the Apostles, this is the work of Capello. The mosaic suffered some damage at its edges when the whole of the central section of the Reredos was raised early in the last century when the third, brown, step was installed. This was donated in memory of Frederick Augustus Howe Fitzgerald, replacing the 1870s mosaic shown left.



Holy Socks

When Catriona asked me if I'd like to write an article for her church magazine, my mind immediately went back to a weekend on Iona a few years ago. We were there to scatter the ashes of relatives of Catriona, who had also been dear friends of my husband's family. I also took the opportunity to deliver an order of Holy Socks to the Iona Community's Shop where our designs have been sold for about 18 of our 21 years existence.

My next thoughts were what do I put in this article and what do I leave out? I'd better start by telling you what Holy Socks are and how they originated.

They are socks with Biblical designs - Jonah in the Whale, The Ark and Rainbow, Sheep and Goats, The Dove and The Found Sheep. (Not the lost sheep. This sheep is definitely found.) We started with two sizes (4-7 and 12 1/2 - 3 1/2) and about half a dozen designs. Now we have from sizes 0 - 21/2 up to 12 -16 for adults with very large feet. We also have more than 30 designs. Many of our designs aren't a pair at all. Pharaoh's Cows have seven ill-favoured cows and seven well favoured cows - on different feet. The latest is our cycle sock with "The Whirling Wheels" on one sock and "Endure to the End" on the other.

They were born in Skelmorlie, a little village on the Clyde coast. I was doing a course with the Scottish Churches Open College, thinking that somehow I was going to land in ordained ministry. A group of us were discussing how we could best, for want of a better way of putting it, pass on our faith or introduce people to God. None of us were keen on what we called "The Jesus loves you t-shirt" method and on seeing someone wearing Wallace and Gromit socks, we decided that Biblical socks would be a much better idea. "Yes, I said, and they'll be called Holy Socks." If no one was doing them, someone should be. I didn't find "Holy Socks" on the web, but I did find more than 600 references to feet and walking in the Bible. It was on reading just a few of these that I realised there was more than a laugh in the idea and Holy Socks, Faith on your Feet were born. The rest as they say is history.



They combine being a symbol of ancient pilgrimage with modern novelty socks. It was on our first sales outing with Holy Socks, at Keswick during convention fortnight that I realised they needed a leaflet. The Holy Socks story was born. Want to hear it from the Whales' point of view? Why couldn't the lions eat Daniel? And what was it like for the "Found Sheep" to be found by the Shepherd? It's all in the Holy Socks stories.

We try to have a range of bright and dark colours; funny, serious and in the middle designs; some which are obviously Christian and some, like The Vine and the Hills which anyone could wear.

Who does wear them? Often I don't know. They're sometimes bought for gifts, and I rarely know whose feet they will end up on, but at the recent Christian Resources Exhibition at Sandown Park in Surrey, we had quite a number of visitors to the stand who pulled up their trouser legs to reveal a pair of Holy Socks they'd bought at a previous show. It is one of the great joys of exhibiting and chatting to customers on the phone, hearing to whom and why, a particular design was going to be given. Often for a reason that you can't share on the website or Facebook.

I know Holy Socks have been taken to India, sent to Brazil, walked on the Great Wall of China, and been worn by Jesuit priests in the Australian outback. They've also cycled in Africa and been seen in Red Square in Moscow. A pair went out to Mongolia with a missionary. Often they'll be on the feet of those going to the office, school or down the high street. Some get worn to football matches and we sponsor a rally crew with socks, which they wear on each round of the Scottish Rally Championship.

Another memory which Catriona's suggestion brought to mind was the Lambeth Conference of 2008. We were asked to be part of the Market Place at the event and what an experience that was. I don't care who comes to the stand, I welcome them all and love to hear their stories, but it is particularly special when one minute you're talking to the Bishop of the Arctic, who's based in Yellowknife in northern Canada (where the Ice Road Truckers leave from) and the next the wife of the Bishop of Tasmania - oh and geographically in between, the wife of the Bishop of Vanuatu. And you also get a visit from the then Archbishop of Canterbury. Rowan Williams, who had visited our Stand at the Christian Resources Exhibition the previous year. At this year's CRE, we had the honour of looking after Rowan Bear who belongs to the director of CRE, Steve Goddard. I had to put a pair of socks on the bear's bare feet.

It's possible we'll return next year to the conference. We'll see..... The last 21 years have been full of surprises. I'm sure there are more to come - thanks to Holy Socks.

I am so grateful that God led me down the Holy Socks road and not to ordained ministry. God is so wise!!! Suits me down the ground.



Commemoration of the Month George Fox, Founder of the Society of Friends (Quakers) 13 January

George Fox was born at Fenny Drayton in Leicestershire in 1624, the son of a weaver, and was himself apprenticed to a shoe-maker. He became something of a wayfarer from 1643 for about three years, loosening all ties with his family and friends. The 'Inner Light of the Living Christ' became his watchword in 1646 and he began to preach that the truth could only be found through the Inner Voice speaking directly to each soul. His society of 'The Friends of Truth' was formed at about this time, clearly a protest against the authoritarianism of the Presbyterian system, and many believers joined. Because of welcoming God into the soul often whilst in a state of trance, which caused much body movement, Gervase Bennet nicknamed them the Quakers in 1650; although meant as a term of abuse, it quickly became a name they themselves adopted. Fox spent several spells in gaol because of his determination to preach



where he would and what he willed; he also made many missionary journeys around England, on the continent and to North America and the West Indies. He had a charismatic personality combined with excellent organisational abilities, which proved a solid foundation for ensuring the continuance of his beliefs and practices. He died on this day in 1691.




