
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


The church is now open for private prayer. The schedule is:

Priest's Letter From Father John



It was 'stir-up' Sunday on 20th November. You know about 'stir-up' Sunday? At the end of the communion service the priest says a prayer that starts,

Stir up, O Lord,

the wills of your faithful people;

that they, plenteously bringing forth the **fruit** of good works, may by you be **plenteously** rewarded...

Then everybody knows it's time to start making a great big Christmas cake. I hope you didn't miss it! I know that our Children's Church didn't – they began making theirs that morning, and are looking forward to collecting them at our Crib Service at 4 p.m. on Christmas Eve.

And then a week later it was Advent Sunday and the countdown to Christmas began, with its children's calendars with little doors and chocolate, cards to write, food to buy, trees to decorate and presents to wrap and send.

And so I'd like to share with you a poem that I know has come to mean so much to so many people:

So Here, it is merry Christmas: everybody's having fun Look to the future Now it's only just begun

Do you recognise it?

Well, ok, so it's not a poem at all, it's a bit of a brainless ditty, first sung by Noddy Holder and Slade in 1973, but it's worked its way into the national consciousness because anybody under 50 has grown up hearing it played at Christmas time every year from the cradle. And it's a song that sums up perfectly the contemporary attitude to Christmas: booze, partying, sex, presents, food and fun.

Now, I'm not saying any of these things aren't to be enjoyed. Feasting and celebration is a big theme in the Bible. But what I am saying is that there's more, so much more, to Christmas. We know this, those of us who make room for Christ at Christmas, don't we? But because so many of our friends and family don't know this, there is a big temptation and a big challenge that faces us.

Our big *temptation* is to be so accommodating to how our families and friends feel about Christmas that we just go along with it and don't make it a special spiritual time for ourselves. Another Christmas goes by in a haze of food, booze, telly, presents and debt where we didn't make that special connection with the root of all reality; where we didn't make space in our own hearts for the God who loves us.

So our big *challenge* is to make sure we carve out time to spend with God this Advent and Christmas, not just with people. Not to put our faith in people's faces,

but quietly and firmly to make sure we nurture the spiritual dimension of who we are at this special time. And my experience is that family and friends generally come to respect the moments made for faith during this time because, deep down, they also know that Christmas is about something deep, something profound, something about hope and generous love.

So how might we make time to tend our spiritual life this Advent and Christmas? Well, here are some suggestions – maybe you could think of others:


- Attend our Advent course Tuesdays at 7 p.m. in The Vicarage. Just turn up, or phone me on 07980 692813
- Attend our special Christmas services details are somewhere in the magazine
- Listen to the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols from King's College, Cambridge usually at 3 p.m. on Christmas Eve or 2 p.m. on Christmas Day
- Watch Songs of Praise every Sunday throughout Advent and Christmas on BBC1 at a 12.15
- Listen to Christmas Carols (and join in)
- Put a time on your calendar to sit down for 15 minutes with your bible once or twice a week. Read again the stories of Jesus' birth from the opening chapters of the Gospels of St Luke and St Matthew. Make time to read Chapter 1 of St John's Gospel on Christmas morning
- As you write a card or wrap a present, quietly say a prayer for the person you're sending it to
- Wait for a clear night and go out into the garden once it's dark. Look up at the stars and thank God that the One who guided the wise men to Jesus is still the one who guides us now
- If you have a nativity set, put a candle in front of it. Light it each evening and quietly pray a prayer of thanks for Jesus as you do so
- Read an Advent book they have short readings for every day leading up to Christmas. Search Amazon or Google 'Advent Books'

But whatever you do, may you succeed in having a holy, peaceful and beautiful

Christmas.

God, who is beyond understanding, is revealed in Jesus Christ. All that we can know or need to know in this world, of divinity is made known to us in the record of his humanity.







The Beveridge Report

The Report, drafted by William Beveridge, was published on 1st December, 1942. It was intended to improve life in Britain and recommended that the government should 'support its citizens from cradle to grave.' It listed 'five evils' which the government should fight. They were:

Want: The lack of basic needs such as food; Ignorance: The lack of a proper education; Disease: The lack of proper medical care;

Idleness: unemployment and Squalor: Poor living conditions.

These were matched by five key proposals:

A National Insurance scheme;
Standard unemployment benefit, which everyone could claim, regardless of wealth, income or social status;
Benefits paid indefinitely;
Free National Health Service;
Family allowance paid for every child.

After the Labour Party victory in the 1945 general election, the Beveridge proposals were adopted and implemented in a series of social policies, which became known as the Welfare State.

The Times called the Report 'a momentous document which should and must exercise a profound and immediate influence on the direction of social change in Britain', while The Manchester Guardian described it as 'a big and fine thing'. The Daily Telegraph said it was a consummation of the revolution begun by David Lloyd George in 1911 and The Archbishop of Canterbury, William Temple, said it was 'the first time anyone had set out to embody the whole spirit of the Christian ethic in an Act of Parliament'.

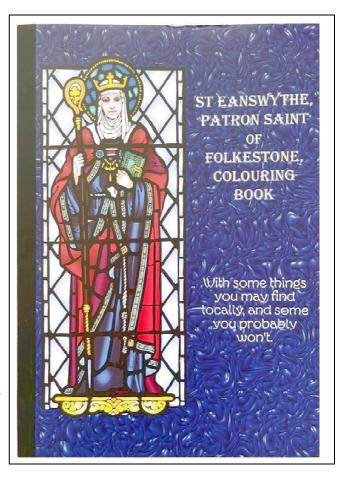


William Beveridge in 1943

St Eanswythe, Patron Saint of Folkestone, Colouring Book



Bookworm – What I've Been Reading

American Dirt – Jeanine Cummins (2020)

Wow. Just, wow. 10/10. I loved this book.

There is a great opening line taking the reader right into the story from the very first sentence: "One of the very first bullets comes in through the open window above the toilet where Luca is standing".

I found this book heart-stopping, breath-taking, moving, shocking, thought-provoking, enlightening, riveting, interesting, and well-researched. I learned so much about cartels, and Mexico and illegal immigration. But I have to say it's put me off visiting Mexico!

Being interested in Spanish, I liked the Spanish words dotted through the text, but I realise this might have been irritating for others. Especially as there was none of that irritating and patronising business of translating every foreign word. Instead the reader was left to work out many of the meanings from the context (or Google Translate).

We've probably all seen TV programmes about migrants getting through the fences on the border between Mexico and the USA, but I knew little about what they actually go through to get there. Jumping onto the roof of a moving train for example – I really felt the fear and tension the first time that was described. Like so many refugees, the characters in this book undergo dangerous journeys seeking the promised land, only to discover they're not wanted when they get there. The USA doesn't want Mexican refugees any more than our politicians want the refugees that come to our shores in little boats or in the back of lorries. And I couldn't help thinking about that all the time I was reading this book.

My Other Husband – Dorothy Koomson (2022)

A very, very good book indeed. Dorothy Koomson writes great psychological thrillers and this one has some magnificent plot twists that I just didn't see coming at all.

It's about a controlling relationship of huge proportion and the impossibility of escape. And bigamy. This made for very exciting and compelling reading, but I can't really say much more without giving away what happens, so you'll have to read it for yourself. Which I strongly recommend.

Dead Rich – GW Shaw (2022)

Well that was a truly excellent book. Quite breath taking at times. And I found myself glued to it, unable to do anything else until I'd finished reading it. GW Shaw is in fact William Shaw, author of the fantastic thrillers featuring Alex Cupidi set on Dungeness, but it is quite different from his usual books, hence the different format of his name.

Dead Rich is set on a Russian-owned superyacht in the Caribbean. There is a very high body count. It is claustrophobic, and there are guns, blood, tropical storms, and a lot of people lying about who they really are. There is also a lot of very interesting technical stuff about sailing. And some very good twists in the plot.

I can't recommend this highly enough. You'll love it - unless you're on a superyacht or any other type of cruise.

Rev Colin Laxon (1944-2022)

It is with sadness we record the death of Rev Colin Laxon, curate in our parish from 1989 to 1994, after a long battle with Parkinson's Disease. Colin's lasting legacy to the parish and the town is the St Augustine's Centre at the foot of Dover Road opposite the junction with St Michael's Street.

By the 1980s the building, consisting of a church on the ground floor and a hall and meeting rooms upstairs, was in a sad state of repair. The small, faithful congregation was unable to fund realistic refurbishment and its future remained in doubt.

The then Vicar, Canon John Dilnot and Colin came up with the plan to renovate the building completely as a centre for worship and social outreach in one of the poorest areas of Folkestone. Colin, with his professional training as a solicitor, and a keen sense of social justice set about the task of raising funds to make the transformation a reality.

The St Augustine's Centre was dedicated to St Augustine and St Mark and St Fotini by Archbishop Carey and the Greek Orthodox Patriarch in 1994. Downstairs a chapel had been created and, as the building was shared by the Greek Orthodox Community in South Kent, beautifully enhanced with icons of the saints. Upstairs the main hall, named the Laxon Hall, had been transformed along with a smaller meeting room and a fully-equipped kitchen.

Soon after this, Colin was 'head-hunted' by the Diocese of Carlisle, where he spent the rest of his ministry exercising his pastoral and social skills to the benefit of the diocese. He served in Barrow-in-Furness; Bampton; Eden (as a team vicar) and Carlisle until his retirement in 2009.

May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

Energy and our Church

We are all facing problems with this at present and the Government has various schemes to ease the burden. However, these do not cover our church's energy bills.

We use electricity mainly for lighting, office equipment and the organ blower. Virtually all of our lighting is now low energy (LED and CFL), we have just replaced our floodlights for the Assumption painting and the mural above the Rood with a reduction from 1220 watts to 150. We try to be sparing with lights during visiting hours.

Our heating is oil-fired with the boilers over 40 years old. They are becoming more difficult to maintain. Diocesan permission to replace the boilers with new oil-fired or gas (involving laying a gas main across the churchyard) would not be granted on environmental grounds. Fellow churchwarden Tom is investigating new heating possibilities. Heat pumps are not the answer as it takes 90-100 years to recoup the cost and they require a lot of electricity. The answer will be some form of electric heating zoned and focussed on the congregation giving a much shorter warm-up time obviating to heat the whole church, including the rafters.

Our current problem is that for the Sunday service the heating has to be turned on at 6 p.m. on Saturday to get the whole church warm, right up to the rafters, at a cost of £80 on last year's prices. So, please dress warmly.

Commemoration of the Month

17 December

Eglantyne Jebb - Founder of 'Save the Children'

Eglantyne Jebb was born in 1876. After studying at Oxford, she became a teacher for a few years until ill-health led to her resignation. She then devoted her energies to charitable works and in 1913 went to Macedonia to help refugees in the Balkan wars. After the First World War, she and her sister Dorothy Buxton founded the Save the Children Fund, which aimed to help children who were suffering in the post-war famine in Europe; a charity which



is now global in its scope. Eglantyne fought for the rights of children to be recognised, her 'Children's Charter' being passed by the League of Nations in 1924. She inspired many by her personal spirituality and was greatly mourned on her death in Geneva on this day in 1928.

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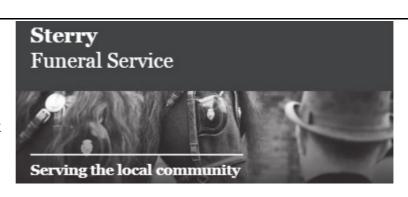
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Music Notes

through the same Jesus Christ our Lord.






