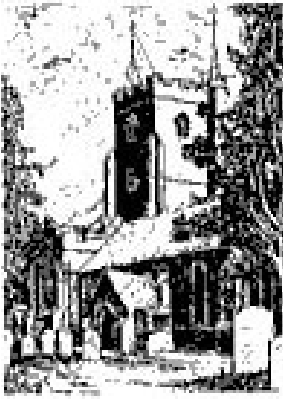

Priest's Letter

From Father John

Dear Friends

The Clocks have gone back, and the Autumn will soon be passing into Winter. It is, for me, a powerful transitional moment that I tried to capture like this:

The Transition

November the nineteenth
it was, one year;
that strange day
when Autumn elides
into Winter
and all creation
holds its breath
and prepares
to hibernate.

The last berries,
nuts and seeds
have ripened;
stores gathered;
leaves dropped;
growing ceased.

There is a hush,
a stillness, in the land
as we walk through it;
only people trespass
on this holy day
with feet shod,
ears deaf,
eyes blind.

And I feel a tug
in my ancient blood
to rebel against
the madness of
this season when,
in all defiance
of the rhythms
of the earth,
people become
even more manic.

To slow,
to still,
to rest.

The liturgies of our church echo this ancient rhythm this month. We experience the profundity and contingency of our fragile gift of life as we celebrate All Saints, All Souls and Remembrance Sunday. This is The Kingdom Season in which our liturgical red echoes the Autumn berries in their silent praise of Christ the King, through whom all is made and remade:

November Harvest

Vermilion,
Crimson,
Scarlet;
Puce:
fire and blood and wine
of the earth's bounty;
berries in the Fall.

And after the glory of Christ the King Sunday we, too, are hushed and quieted; readying ourselves for the season of Advent when we contemplate the coming of our King to us in the vulnerability and humility of our own human condition. We, too, will humble ourselves and prepare ourselves to receive the Christ Child afresh.

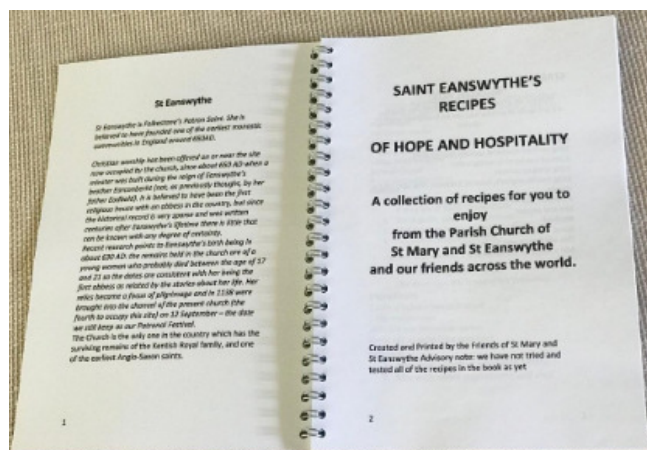
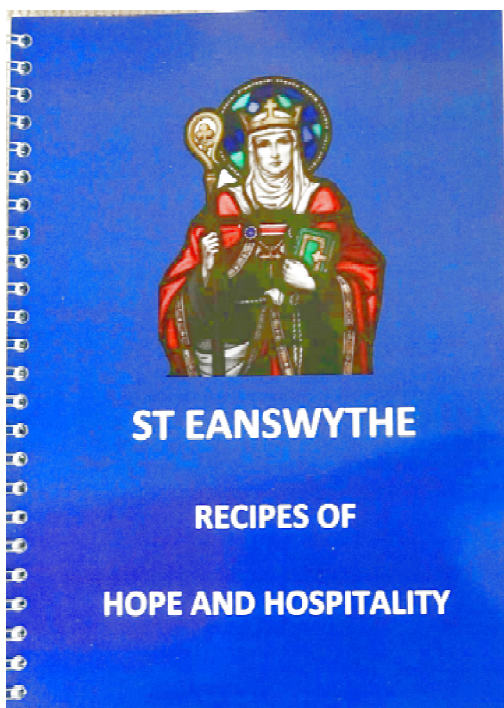

Bookworm – What Catriona Has Been Reading

A Winter Grave – Peter May (2023)

This was a very good read. It's set mainly in the year 2051, in a remote area of Scotland, and is an exciting thriller with several twists in the plot and a moderate body count. Not to mention some interesting futuristic technological devices, which really set me thinking. It's also about climate change. The weather has become so hot at the equator that no one can live there anymore, while Scotland is permanently under several feet of snow. I can't really say much about the plot without spoilers. So I suggest you read it for yourself. You won't regret it.

The Good Left Undone – Adriana Trigiani (2022)

I do like a good family saga, so this was a perfect choice for my holiday reading, even though I found it a little hard to get into.

Matelda is dying and thinking back over her life. The good parts and the bad, of love found and love lost. Set in Italy, France and Scotland it tells of the last 100 years of her family, the Cabrellis.

Most of the action is either set in the present day or during World War 2 when Matelda's mother was a nurse. Based on fact, it tells of the shocking treatment given to male Italians living in the UK at the time. Deemed to be enemy aliens they were rounded up and shipped off to Canada and Australia and other distant places. Some were lucky and only got sent to the Isle of Man or Orkney. This is well worth reading, as are all Adriana Trigiani's books.

The Great Passion – James Runcie (2022)

This is a different type of family saga altogether, an enjoyable and interesting novel about life in the household of Johann Sebastian Bach. It's set over a year between 1726 and 1727 and the story is told from the point of view of Stefan Silbermann, an 11 year old boy who is packed off to boarding school in Leipzig soon after his mother has died.

Stefan's father is an organ builder, so Stefan knows lots about organs and can play well. But his father wants him to learn to sing too. After running away from school to flee the bullies, Stefan finds himself living in the Bach household where Mrs Bach number 2 (Anna Magdalena) is almost continuously pregnant having one child after another. It is a happy place, full of music. He falls in love with one of the daughters and spends a lot of time worrying that his voice is about to break, which would spoil his singing voice.

Initially Bach is writing a cantata a week, but later in the book he starts writing the St Matthew Passion, which was first performed on Good Friday near the end of the book. Although I have sung some of the pieces mentioned, it has mostly been in English, so (to my shame) I didn't recognise the German titles or extracts.

Many thanks to Ian for lending me this book. I thoroughly enjoyed it.

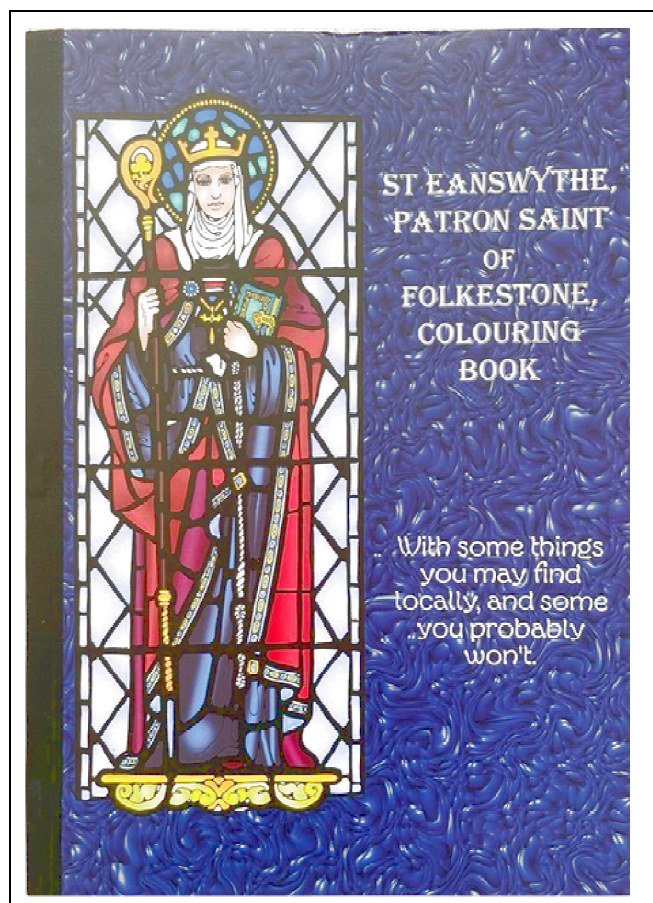

St Eanswythe, Patron Saint of Folkestone, Colouring Book

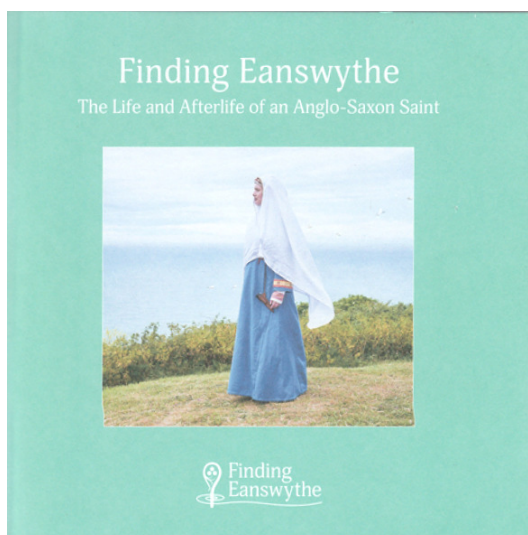

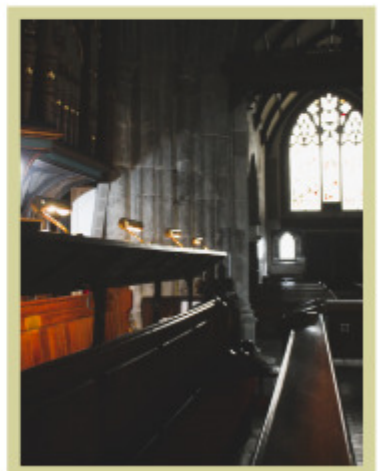

A Listening Ear and Prayers for Healing

at St Mary & St Eanswythe Folkestone

Would you like a home visit?

Do you know someone who would?

Would you like prayers for healing?

A Listening Ear - Why do we need this?

With Fr John often unwell and soon to retire, it's vital that we keep looking after one another.

Therefore, we now have a dedicated team of pastoral visitors to help give pastoral care and a listening ear to those who need it. At present, our Pastoral Care Team are:

David Wright (*Pastoral Visitor and Pastoral Care Co-ordinator*)

Jan Clarke (*Pastoral Visitor*)

Tom Bertram (*Pastoral Visitor*)

Listening well needs skill and time. Our team of pastoral visitors have been chosen because they've got both. They have all received training and have a clean DBS certificate.

But offering a listening ear also needs something else: we need to know who needs it! Very often we don't hear that someone needs a visit until it's too late. So we're asking you to help us.

How our Listening Ear Programme will work

Step 1

If you hear that a member of our congregation is ill or can no longer get to church, please contact the Pastoral Care Co-ordinator to let him know. If you know the person's phone number, please ask their permission to pass it to our Pastoral Care Team.

We're also happy to offer a listening ear to those who are connected with our church but don't necessarily attend services.

Our Pastoral Care Co-ordinator is:

Please also contact him if you would like a visit yourself!

Step 2

One of our team of Pastoral Visitors will be asked to make initial contact by phone to offer a visit. They will then make a visit, if that is agreed.

Step 3

If needed, the Pastoral Visitor can call on the Clergy or Pastoral Care Co-ordinator for support or a visit with the person's agreement; for example, to offer Home Communion or anointing for healing.

How you can help

- 1.** Look out for those who normally come to church and, if they're missing unexpectedly or you know they're unwell, alert the Pastoral Care Co-ordinator.
- 2.** If you know someone who would appreciate a listening ear, ask them if they'd like a visit from our Pastoral Care Team. If they say yes and give permission, pass their number to our Pastoral Care Co-ordinator.
- 3.** Please pray for those who are ill, grieving or housebound.
- 4.** If you are interested in becoming a pastoral visitor talk to the Pastoral Care Co-ordinator. He will explain the kind of skills you need. If you think that's you, you'll need his approval. If he disagrees, he'll tell you why.

Prayers for Healing

Tom and Anne Bertram have been trained at our Diocesan healing centre, the Living Well, to offer prayers for healing.

They will be offering prayers for healing at our Sunday Eucharist on the 1st Sunday of each month.

After receiving communion themselves, they will go to the Eanswythe Chapel. If you would like to receive prayers for healing of body, mind or spirit, then please go to the Eanswythe Chapel after you have received communion or a blessing.

Tom and Anne will pray with you and, if you wish, anoint you with the oil of healing.

Dear community of St Mary's and St Eanswythe with Saviours,

I can't believe it's already been over two months since we moved from Folkestone to Cuddesdon. Despite some hiccups with our flat in Folkestone and the moving, we are finally settled here. I moved on September 1st, and my wife arrived on 17th as she was sorting the last details on our flat in Folkestone whilst I was sorting our accommodation here in Cuddesdon. The last two weeks have been very busy with the induction here in Ripon College Cuddesdon and then at the University of Oxford.

Please pray that God will give me the strength and wisdom to manage all the commitments without sacrificing a good time as a couple. Becky, my wife, continues looking for a job, but sadly she hasn't found anything yet. It's been hard to find something suitable because of the side effects of her medications, which means that she can't drive. We live in a very rural area, and the closest bus stop is 2 miles from here. Please pray that she can find something, which will give her a sense of purpose, and also that she can work remotely. This term I will be covering four modules at Ripon College Cuddesdon: Introduction to preaching, Introduction to Worship, Pastoral Care and Elements of Ministry and Worship. In addition, I have to write four papers at Oxford: Doctrine, Context and Practice; An Experiential Project with Theological Reflection; Sociology of Religion and The Use of the Bible. After that, I need to write a dissertation of 20,000 words. I haven't decided my topic yet, but it will probably be on something related to the Holy Spirit and the marginalised in Luke-Acts.

I've been following the news with great happiness about St Eanswythe's reliquary. My prayer is that the community will continue to grow in its love for God and for our neighbours.

May the love of God be abundant in your lives, miss you all.

News From The Rainbow Centre

I recently attended a Church Liaison Officer (CLO) Meeting. We were given a very interesting talk by Louise Gotch the Homeless Support Manager. She explained that the Homeless Support Service works within three areas of expertise.

1. An advice and advocacy service
2. The Day centre which includes the Breakfast Club. At present it is supporting approximately 47 rough sleepers and other vulnerable people. There is support from a nurse who is able to give individual advice and a charity dental van visits each quarter. There is also a regular podiatrist health van. Hopefully in the future there may be also a pharmacy service.
3. The Winter Shelter will be run on similar lines as last year. This is the final year of Government funding so new funding initiatives are being explored. Like across the rest of the country Folkestone has been hit by rising rents. A bedsit can cost £400 a month. Louise explained that recently the Rainbow Centre has organised events between landlords and estate agents to help tackle the problem. Clients are being given Life Skills Training to help show they can be responsible tenants.

At the meeting we are encouraged to talk about our own Church's initiatives. It is amazing what goes on! Churches (Folkestone, Hythe and The Marsh) are involved in the foodbank, youth groups, a baby basics charity. urban pastor support, lunch clubs, and refugee support. Finally the annual Walk of Kings will take place on the 6th January. Details to follow.

Andrew the Apostle, Patron Saint of Scotland 30 November

Though Andrew is named among the apostles in the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, it is in John's gospel that most is learned about him. Andrew was a Galilean fisherman, mending his nets, when Jesus called him to follow him, which he promptly did. He then seems to have remained with Jesus until the end. He was there at the feeding of the five thousand and then later, when some Greeks in Jerusalem wanted to see Jesus, Philip brought them to Andrew who told Jesus of their desire. Tradition has him travelling on several missionary journeys and eventually being martyred by being crucified on an X-shaped cross. He became the patron saint of Scotland because of a legend that his relics had been taken there in the eighth century.

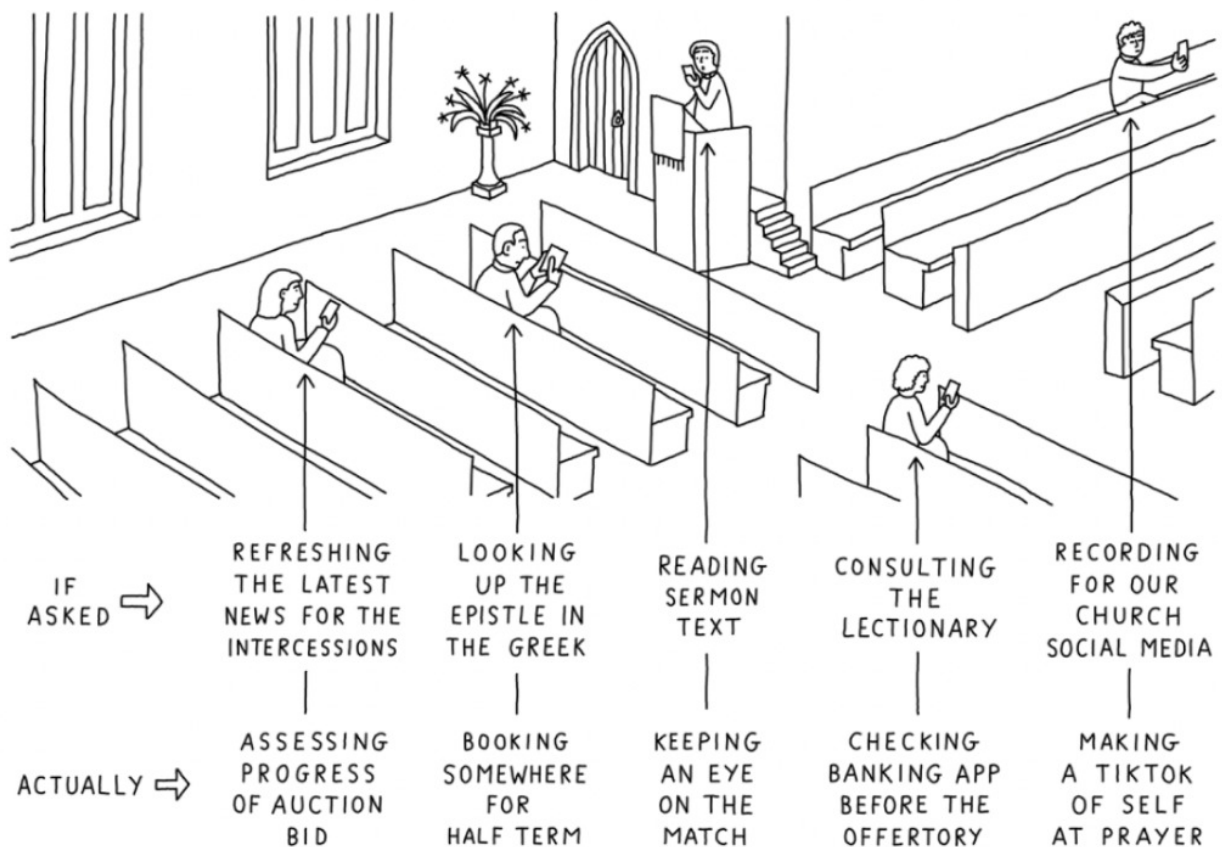

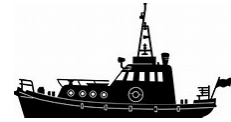

Companions of Eanswythe – Holy Habits Part 2



The first Holy habit I would like to unfold is that of Eating Together, and that is because we have already begun to do this.

The tradition of people eating together being a sign of God's reign or kingdom goes way back into Judaeo-Christian history. It is a picture painted by the prophets and celebrated in the psalms:

'On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-matured wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-matured wines strained clear.' *Isaiah 25:6*

'You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.' *Psalms 23:5*

Jesus was rooted in and lived this tradition. Just as he shared food with all sorts and conditions of people as a sign of the inclusivity of God's kingdom, so too did the early church. The gatherings to eat together were earthly representations of the heavenly banquet imagery that had been reinforced by Jesus through his teaching as well as his actions. Following in the footsteps of Jesus, the table fellowship of the early Christians was warm and accepting. They refused to discriminate against the marginalised. All were welcome to partake of this basic human and yet deeply sacred activity.

The joy of eating together, the value of table fellowship for deepening relationships, the missional fruitfulness of shared meals and the opportunities for sharing faith, biblical study, prayer and worship around the meal table have all been rediscovered many times by both new and ancient forms of church.

Many of you stayed after the Harvest Festival Service for the first of our regular bring and share lunches, and I was delighted that we were also joined by a number of people who do not regularly attend any church. The idea of a bring and share lunch was born out of a conversation with a member of the congregation as a means to reduce the burden of organising such a lunch on just a few people. Everyone had a hand in making the lunch a success. We ended the lunch with the Benedictine Office of None (sometimes pronounced *known*). This is us exploring the Holy Habit of Eating Together and I sincerely hope you will join with the next bring and share lunch which is planned for **Sunday 10th December**.

The Community Room, 19 The Bayle

Where Dance Easy once used to stand in The Bayle, there is now a new building, sensitively designed to be in keeping with its companion residences along this very special street, at the heart of old Folkestone. Simply described now as 19 The Bayle, the front of this construction has a unique and special ingredient: The Community Room.

The former building meant much to local people, offering traditional tea dances, radical comedy stand-up, mindful yoga classes and many other activities all creating memories of good times. In its day, it was a sign of the community at play, leisure and pleasure, allegedly all thanks to a legacy from a Folkestone chocolate manufacturer.

Negotiations with the owner to secure the opportunity were part of the Bayle Residents Association response to changing times and the reality that Dance Easy was no longer viable.

The Community Room takes its name straight from the fire alarm system: that's what it says on the screen and that's what it says on the proverbial tin: it's a space designed to support community in a new way, reflecting the interesting times we live in.

Management is the responsibility of Sunflower House, a respected local charity who are responsible for the eponymous building on Foord Road, near the glorious railway viaduct.

There, a new regime has developed over the last two years working with partners to support the most vulnerable members of our community: the homeless, those struggling with life and with addiction, while providing new opportunity for all. Community Theatre, Repair Café, Warm Bank provision, Ukrainian Community School, BKK martial arts for the whole family, C3 Craft Group and much more besides.

The same approach is now being used to build a diary of activities at The Community Room and engage partners, including St Eanswythe School, the local TakeOff well-being support group, to facilitate writing workshops, talks and lectures, community art projects, councillor surgery and consultation sessions. By sharing the cost of the facility, Sunflower House also aims to empower our community – and that includes the very local community around The Bayle – with some valuable help already being offered by local people who can see the potential to be part of a wider community spirit.

It is a vision of Community Building, Building Community that we hope will spread into a larger network of community hubs in the next few years: a network of spaces which are committed to that same empowerment and opportunity across the district, all helping us to meet the challenges we can see rising up before us in 2023.
