Priest's Letter From Father Chris

In amongst the autumnal colouring, darker evenings and for us in Folkestone, stormier weather - November also brings with it a sense of poignancy. Within the wider life of the nation, we have Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day to focus our minds on the sacrifices made by so many down the years. This, primarily, is based around the 'ultimate sacrifice' made by those who have laid down their



lives in armed conflict but in recent years thoughts have also widened to embrace the sacrifices made by those who serve and who still bear the scars of this service. Within the life of the church, we'll be marking Remembrance Sunday during our usual 10.30 a.m. service and I will also have the privilege, as Mayor's Chaplain, of being involved in the Town's civic acts of remembrance across that week too.

But our remembering begins even before that. In the first couple of days of November we mark All Saints and All Souls Days where we recall the great company of heaven and those who have gone before us in faith along with our own departed loved ones. It's an opportunity to celebrate and commemorate the saints with a big 'S' and a little 's'. The big 'S' for those recognised by the Church for their holiness of life and devotion to God – not least our own patrons, Our Lady and St Eanswythe. The little 's' for those whose faith may well have been recognised and many and inspired the people around them, but on a smaller scale.

In their well-known stories, the Saints offer us a clear pattern of devotion to God in the face of all sorts of challenges and experiences. Yet, in life and faith, it's often those who don't attract fame or attention who provide us with fine examples to follow and who encourage us along the way. They're those who quietly got on with things, whose faithful devotion to us but also to God frequently provided us with a firm foundation and inspiration from an early age. At All Souls' we have an opportunity to recall them and to thank God for their lives and the impact that they've had on ours. In amongst the thankfulness, there's often a poignancy as we recall their loss and do please look after yourself and reach out for help and support if you need to.

Whoever and whatever you're remembering this November, please be assured of our prayers and may the prayers and inspiration of the Saints above and the saints on earth go with us all.





Sunday and Red Letter Eucharist Gospels

2 November - All Saints' Sunday - Matthew 5.1-12

'Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.'

It is not influence, power or even great virtue that is the mark of sainthood. The grace of God which changes and sanctifies ordinary people is the glory of his Kingdom.

9 November - Remembrance Sunday - Luke 20.27-38

'He is not God of the dead but of the living.'

God has revealed to us his gift of eternal life, but its nature is beyond our human understanding. We hold fast to that faith and do not try to impose our own theories upon it.

16 November – 2nd before Advent – Luke 21.5-19

'By your endurance you will save your souls.'

The Bible never promises an easy life or a world free from trouble. It teaches that God has an ultimate purpose for his creation and that his people must be faithful until it is fulfilled.

23 November – Christ the King. Luke 23.33-43

There was also an inscription over him, 'This is the King of the Jews.'

The promised Messiah came but his kingship was not as his people had expected.

He passed through suffering and death
before his work of salvation was fulfilled.

Saturday 1 November – All Saint's Day – Luke 6.20-31

Magnification!

When I was a child, we used to have great fun with magnifying glasses. We discovered a whole new world in the garden for instance: the delicate structure of apple blossom on the tree; ants scurrying about their nest; or finger nails and finger prints and even letters on the printed page. Amazing!

What sent me off on this course of thinking?


Well, it is the words of the Prayer of Preparation we say at the start of our Eucharist or Holy Communion services. We pray that:

'we may perfectly love you and *worthily magnify* your holy name' (my italics).

We pray that who we are and how we behave might be seen as examples, to all whom we meet, of that extraordinary love which Christ displayed throughout his ministry. What a challenge! We hope and pray that wherever we are and whatever we do will enable others to see that love in action – magnified by Christ's presence with us. It is easy to pay lip-service to our beliefs, but harder to show them in action, to show people, as through a magnifying glass, that there is so much more to our Christian lives than might be apparent from first impressions.

The words of the Prayer of Preparation are neatly balanced by the Prayer after Communion when we pray that God will send us out in the power of his spirit to live and work to his praise and glory. No easy matter in these days of social and political polarisation; a real challenge. No one promised that it would be easy – even Christ himself who said to his disciples 'take up your cross and follow me.'

Finding Eanswythe



Whilst the Finding Eanswythe Project has come to a conclusion, the working group will continue with their research. This book covers the findings over the six-year programme with a series of essays covering such topics as The Legend of St Eanswythe, A Minster in the early Mediaeval Landscape, Minster to Priory, Folkestone and the English Reformation, St Eanswythe's Water, St Eanswythe's Chapel, Matthew Woodward and Eanswythe Found. All by various members of the Research Group.



Commemoration

Hilda, Abbess of Whitby 19 November

Hilda was born in 614 of the royal house of Northumbria. Baptised in York at the age of twelve by the Roman missionary Paulinus, she was later an influential lay leader of the Church. She was encouraged by Aidan of Lindisfarne to become a Religious, and subsequently established a monastery at Streanaeshalch (Whitby). This house became a great centre of learning and was the meeting-place for the important Synod of Whitby in the year 664 at which Hilda's rôle was that of a reconciler between the Roman and the Celtic traditions. She is remembered as a great educator, exemplified in her nurturing of Caedmon's gift of vernacular song. She died in November in the year 680.



Crooked Cross – Sally Carson (1934, reissued 2025)

This chilling and ultimately tragic novel tells of the lives of an ordinary family, the Klugers, who live in Kranach, Bavaria, close to the border with Austria. Lexa is engaged to be married to Moritz, a Catholic who is deemed to be Jewish simply because of his surname, Weissmann. This leads to loss of his job, poverty and increasing danger. Her brothers Helmy and Erich are enthralled by Hitler and the Nazi Party, which has provided them with both a purpose in life and regular, secure employment. Lexa has never been interested in politics but sees the effects on her family and fiancé; in addition her friends start to turn away from her because of her lack of loyalty to the Party. Meanwhile, Michael, a young Englishman visiting the town, realises that the price the German people are paying for their beliefs in the Party is a strange feeling of unrest and uncertainty. People become afraid to talk, especially about politics, and are constantly looking over their shoulders to check who is listening.

The interesting thing about this book is that it was published in 1934, four years before the outbreak of the second world war, but it shows both the increasing public fervour of belief in the Nazi Party, alongside the loss of status and horrendous treatment of the Jews. The book opened the eyes of many in the UK to exactly what was occurring in Germany, and could perhaps be summed up by this quotation: "All felt the power, the seduction of Hitler's voice and its promises. Young people were enthralled by it, captivated. Older people realised its significance too."

This book was reissued by Persephone publishers earlier this year and has been a runaway success, going through several re-printings and receiving some well-deserved excellent reviews. It was also read as the Book at Bedtime on Radio 4 in August – if it's still available on BBC Sounds it's well worth a listen. But, of course, the book itself is even better.

Folkestone Churches Winter Shelter Now Recruiting Volunteers!

The Winter Shelter is a service provided jointly by Folkestone Churches and the Rainbow Centre between December and February, right here in Folkestone. In the 2024/25 Winter Shelter we received 15 guests (4 women and 11 men, plus a dog and a cat) through the 12 beds available. They stayed in a local B&B, in en suite rooms, and every evening enjoyed home cooked food, prepared by volunteers from local churches and other organisations.

As you may be aware our church is going to be responsible for preparing and serving the food to the 12 guests in this year's winter shelter, every Monday evening from 1 December until 28 February. *That's 13 Monday evenings for which we need volunteers!*

We'll need volunteers to prepare and cook the food, deliver it to the Westward Ho! Hotel, where the Winter Shelter will be located, welcome and chat with the guests, serve the food, and wash and clear up afterwards.

I have volunteered to co-ordinate all this for our church, so will make sure that we have volunteers to prepare a main course and a pudding each Monday – also checking that we aren't duplicating the menu choices from the other churches that week, as lasagne and apple crumble 3 nights in a row could be a bit tiresome! I will also prepare the rotas to make sure that we have sufficient volunteers at the venue. I'll be there every Monday evening, but you have the choice to volunteer for once a week, once a fortnight, or as required. (Or not at all, obviously!)
