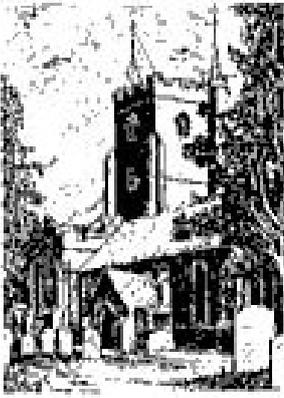

Priest's Letter From Father Chris



I'm not necessarily renowned for my patience – being chief of staff to a beagle sets life at a certain pace and any slackness in meeting demands in a timely manner is greeted with a chorus of disapproving howls. Sister Jemima-Mildred often takes Psalm 59 verse 15 a little too literally for my tastes. But, four-pawed taskmasters aside, I'm generally someone who likes to get on with things and complete tasks in a timely manner. It's a continued work in progress to sit back and savour things more.

In theory, December is a time of waiting and of preparation. The season of Advent calls us to 'stay awake' and 'be prepared' for the arrival of Jesus. It's also one of those seasons where we are invited to shine a light into dark places and allow God to do the same with us and our lives; that light being the light of Christ.

In reality, Advent is undoubtedly a time of preparation and one where we find we stay awake but rather than pondering God's presence with us, it can be because of a slight panic as to whether we've remembered to post something in time or if we've got the particular thing that so-and-so likes for lunch etc.

It's not uncommon for vicars to get 'grumpy' about the loss of Advent as a season of preparation and recollection – not just of the first coming of Jesus but also of his second coming at the end of time. Sometimes vicars just like an excuse to be grumpy but there's probably something else underlying it.


The celebration of Christmas is wonderful and a great joy (hopefully!) but let's make sure that the trappings and the tinsel don't obscure the real power of this time of year - the reminder that God became one of us in the person of Jesus and will return one day at the end of time to be our judge. Those things have profound consequences that will long outlast the last pine needle on the tree and the sigh of relief at getting everything back in the loft again. As we move through December, can you take some time to ponder those deeper implications a bit? And check out the Christmas services page so we can celebrate this great festival together!

Sunday and Red Letter Eucharist Gospels

Note: for the Church Year Advent 2025 - Eve of Advent 2026, the Sunday Eucharist gospel reading is taken from that of Matthew with John's gospel featuring on notable feast days.

These notes are from 'Following the Gospel Through the Year' by Fr Raymond Chapman, a non-stipendiary priest in the diocese of Southwark, Emeritus Professor of English in the University of London and a Vice-Chairman of the Prayer Book Society. He died in 2013.

Sunday 7 December - 2nd Sunday of Advent: **Matthew 3.1-12**

John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness.

We do well sometimes to withdraw from the comforts and activities of daily life, and find time for quiet reflection. Even a few minutes waiting in stillness upon God can give much strength.

Sunday 14 December - 3rd Sunday of Advent: **Matthew 11.2-11**

'Are you the one who is to come or are we to wait for another?'

God works quietly but with complete constancy. When doubts and anxiety come close, we remember how his promises have been fulfilled in all ages.

Sunday 21 December - 4th Sunday of Advent: **Matthew 1.18-25**

'You are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins'

The Bible tells of many battles and conflicts, some hard to reconcile with the divine call to love. But Christ's conquest of evil is our assurance that we need fear no assaults upon the soul.

Sunday 28 December – Holy Innocents: **Matthew 2.13-18**

'When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, he was infuriated and sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under.

All through history, suffering has come to the innocent as much as to those who have done no wrong. Only faith in the ultimate power of love can support us in this terrible mystery.

through the same Jesus Christ our Lord.



News from St Eanswythe' School


Greetings from St Eanswythe's School





How well do you know our church?

Last month we were asked to find a memorial to a mother of two daughters and seven sons one of whom grew up to be a world-class 17th century scientist. Well, the mother was Joan Harvey, who died in 1605. Her memorial is to be found in an engraved brass plaque mounted on the wall by the door to the Vestry. This is believed to be a copy of her gravestone – the words *‘Whose soul rests in Heaven her body in this grave’*. Standing by this plaque and looking to the west we can see the glorious Harvey Window filling the west wall of the nave installed in memory of her son, William.

This month’s challenge is to find the piece of furniture in our church that was made from the belfry beams when the new set of bells and framework was installed in 1879. Good hunting!

Commemoration

This new series of Commemorations is drawn from a splendid, comprehensive book 'Prayers for Saints' by Rupert Bristow, Canterbury Diocesan Director of Education 1995-2008 and Reader in the Holy Trinity Benefice here in Folkestone. He died in 2016 after a courageous battle with cancer.

John of the Cross **poet, teacher of the faith, priest** **14 December**

Born at Fontibere near Avila, into an impoverished noble family, Juan de Yepes was brought up by his widowed mother and went to study at the college of Jesuits. At 21 he joined the Carmelite Friars in Madeira, studied theology at Salamanca and was ordained priest in 1567. Invited to reform the Carmelite house of Duruelo by Teresa of Avila, he laboured against great opposition and was eventually confined in Toledo, where he was inspired to write some of his spiritual poetry, including *The Dark Night of the Soul*. Escaping after nine months, he acted as superior in various houses, taking the moderate line in disputes within the order and continuing his writing, before once again being banished, to Andalusia in Spain, where he died.


St Eanswythe's Lead Reliquary at The Beaney

It felt very special indeed to visit the temporary exhibition at The Beaney in Canterbury, where the original lead reliquary that held St Eanswythe until 2020 is currently on display.



I found it really quite beautiful in its own way, with a simple decorative pattern, but very distorted (probably crushed from its round/oval shape to hide it in the wall during the Reformation), and far larger than I imagined in comparison with the new reliquary.

The lead reliquary was discovered hidden in the north wall of the chancel in June 1885. It is believed likely that it was made from lead panels from a Roman coffin and reconfigured during Anglo-Saxon times. The photos show the reliquary with the lid removed, and a contemporary drawing of it in 1885.



We spent a long time looking at it and watching the film *Three Days in January* about the examination of the bones by the archaeological team in 2020. You can view the 16 minute film on YouTube at

As you know, since 2024 St Eanswythe's relics have been held in a new, specially commissioned reliquary in our church as the lead one was damaging the bones.



I would encourage you to visit the exhibition if you can: *What Remains? An exhibition about Canterbury's ancestors, ethics, history and science* in the Special Exhibitions Room at The Beaney, Canterbury until 29 March 2026. Closed Mondays.

Bookworm: What Catriona Has Been Reading

The Rose Code – Kate Quinn (2021)

This was a wonderful book about three very different young women (and many more people) working on the top secret codebreaking work at Bletchley Park during WW2.

The main characters are Osla – upper class socialite whose boyfriend is none other than Prince Philip; Mab, who is 6 foot tall and from the east end of London; and Beth – initially quiet as a mouse and under the thumb of her domineering and spiteful mother. Osla works on translations as she speaks German, Mab starts off typing but then moves onto the hot and sweaty work with the bombes (code breaking machines) for which her height makes her ideal, and Beth turns out to be one of Bletchley Park's best codebreakers.

We follow the ups and downs in their friendship and romances, life at Bletchley Park, the progress of the war, and the terror and frustration of one of them who has been committed to an asylum. There is also the discovery that there was a traitor in their midst. Some of it is heartbreaking, but it is also very exciting. The author's note at the end tells how the characters are based on real people and it becomes clear just how well researched this book is.

For me this was 600+ pages of joyous reading about a subject that fascinates me. I've only given you a very sketchy idea of the storyline because otherwise there would be loads of spoilers. But it's a book I wanted to go on for ever and I can't recommend it enough.

A Good Man in Africa – William Boyd (1981)

In my opinion William Boyd is at his best when he is writing about Africa (as in this book) and thrillers. This is his first novel, published in 1981; it won the Whitbread First Novel Award, and rightly so. It's brilliant!

Morgan Leafy, is First Secretary at the British High Commission in the West African state of Kinjanja. This is a third, or even fourth, rate posting for diplomats, and he's not terribly good at his job. He gets into a lot of scrapes, giving the reader plenty to laugh at. It's really rather a humorous book.

Despite being portrayed as being unattractive and decidedly overweight, Morgan is surprisingly popular with women, and remarkably promiscuous, but something always goes wrong with his relationships, and none of his choices of partner are very wise.

There is plenty about the complexities of African politics and corruption, and the effect on the lives of the British diplomats and other ex-pats. There is also the impact of superstition and beliefs, which give our hopeless hero the problem of removing the dead body of a servant before the arrival of the Duchess of Ripon (the nearest thing they get to a Royal visit).

This is a wonderfully enjoyable book, which has reminded me that I must get on and read the rest of Boyd's earlier work. I adored this book and I'm sure you will too.


