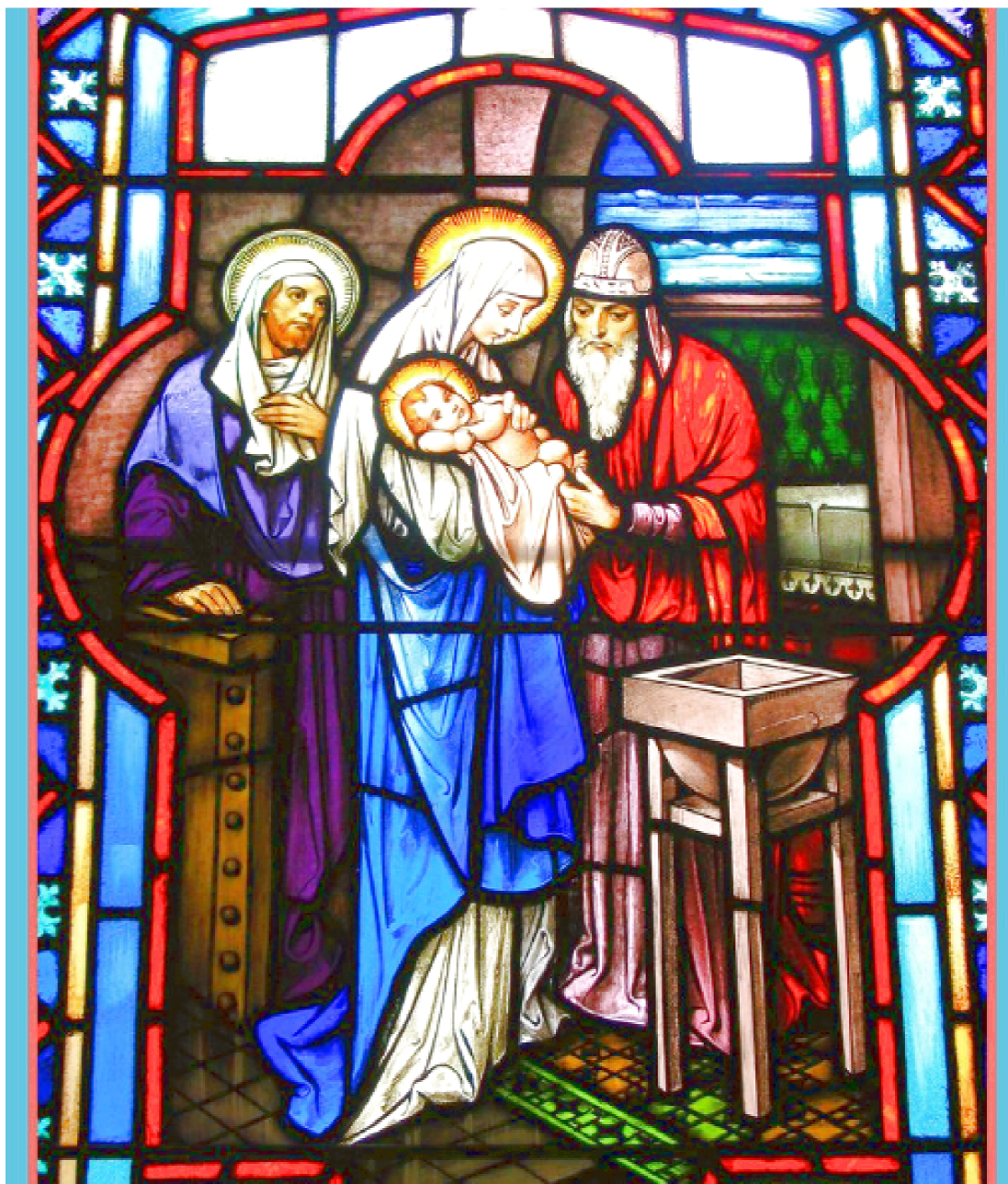
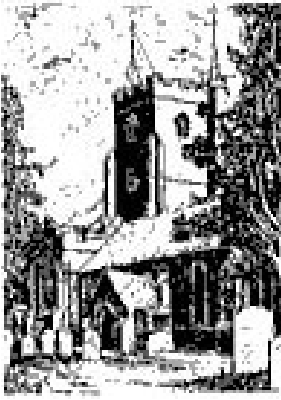

## Priest's Letter

### From Father Chris



I'm writing this a few days after the conclusion of the ill-fated Ashes tour... Non-cricket fans do bear with me, it won't be a complete rant and there's a message behind it.

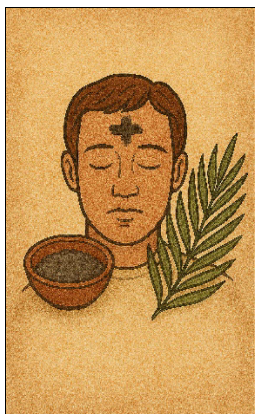
There have been a number of facets of the series that have stood out, not least a total playing time of just 16 days out of the 25 available (with only part of two days lost to bad weather). But the thing that's been particularly apparent is the relationship between the individual player and the whole team and the impact this has had for the whole side. England relied rather on 'a clutch of individuals being brilliant' to carry the whole side through, whereas Australia went for a more traditional 'we'll all put our shoulders to the wheel' and push through together. Unfortunately for England, a 'clutch' of good individuals was rarely even a 'brace' in each match and that lack of responsibility towards one another rather really showed. Individual brilliance and persistence is no bad thing, but no single player can bear the whole team's load (unless Jesus himself decided to strap his pads on – and we've yet to see *that* particular miracle played out at home or away!).

So, what am I pondering this month? Well, on the 18<sup>th</sup> we will be making our way into the wilderness of Lent. 40 days and 40 nights. It'd be nice to take the Bazball approach and bash swiftly through that particular innings towards Easter in just 2/3s of the allotted time but, a) we can't just tear up the rule book like that and, b) it would be missing a valuable opportunity to allow God to play the long-game with us over that period of time. This might perhaps be done through a developed habit or by giving up something that gets in the way. Lent is an important time of individual development in our relationship with God and seeing how we can grow in faith and character. It's an opportunity to face up to the things we need to change within ourselves – rather than just deflecting or blaming circumstances, things or others. It's also an important time for developing 'the team' too. As we grow in faith and relationship with God as individuals, so too we can journey together as a team or community towards Easter and to seek to 'discern' – to work out and understand – what God would have us do and how. Groups, teams or institutions that rely on the shoulders of one person or just a few find themselves vulnerable. It doesn't have to be showy or spectacular. If each player can put a few runs on the board and hold their catches, it's amazing what a difference it can make to the result. It might be as simple as numbers on the hymn board or some prayers from the stands; how might you be able to play your part in the team this Lent (and beyond)?

## The Reader's Ramblings

### Ash Wednesday and the Gift of Beginning Again



February always feels like a transition month — winter still holding on, but the first hints of light beginning to return. This year, that sense of transition is echoed beautifully in the Church's calendar, as we step into Lent with Ash Wednesday on 18th February. It is a day that invites us to pause, to breathe, and to remember who we are and *whose* we are.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, the season of prayer, fasting, and generosity that prepares us for Easter. It is a solemn day, but not a gloomy one. When we come forward to receive the cross of ash on our foreheads, we hear words that are both honest and hopeful: a reminder of our mortality, and a call to turn again towards God. The ashes themselves are made from the palms of last year's Palm Sunday — a quiet sign that even our celebrations, once past, can be transformed into something that helps us grow.

Lent is often described as a journey of forty days, echoing Jesus' time in the wilderness. It is a season that asks us to slow down, to pay attention, and to make space for God. Many people choose to give something up; others choose to take something on. But at its heart, Lent is not about self-improvement or spiritual achievement. It is about returning — returning to God, returning to ourselves, returning to the path of love that we so easily wander from in the busyness of life.

Perhaps this year, Lent might be less about “trying harder” and more about “coming home.” What would it look like to create small moments of stillness in your week? To pray with a simple sentence each morning? To reach out to someone who needs encouragement? To give generously, not out of duty, but out of gratitude? Lent is not meant to weigh us down; it is meant to free us.

Ash Wednesday, with its stark honesty, is the doorway into that freedom. When we receive the ashes, we acknowledge our frailty — but we also acknowledge God's mercy. We begin the season not with despair, but with hope. The shape traced on our foreheads is the same shape traced on us at baptism: the sign of belonging, the sign of love that does not let us go.

As we move through February and into Lent, may this season be for each of us a time of gentle turning. A time to rediscover prayer. A time to notice God's presence in the ordinary. A time to let go of what burdens us and to take hold of what brings life. And above all, a time to walk with Christ — through the wilderness, towards the cross, and into the joy of Easter morning.

May we enter this season with open hearts, ready to begin again.

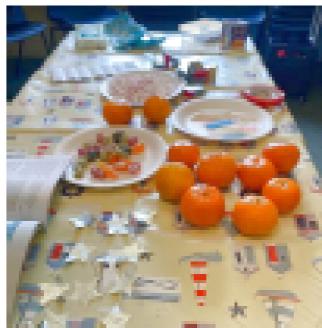

**BEGINNINGS!**

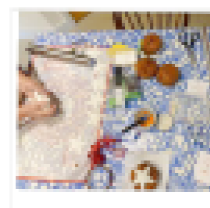
However, before you find out about that, we need to look back to December and our Christingle making and lighting - a great

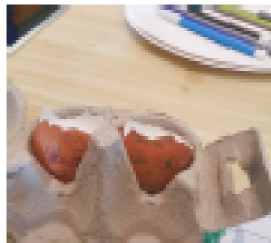


Now back to January 2026!

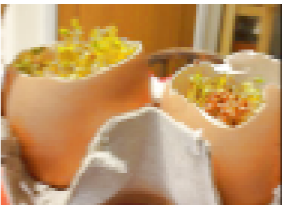
One way we can remember that God cares for us is to care for something ourselves – and what better way than to begin some new lives with CRESS SEEDS?

We sowed our seeds – and as long as we look after them, giving them light and care -

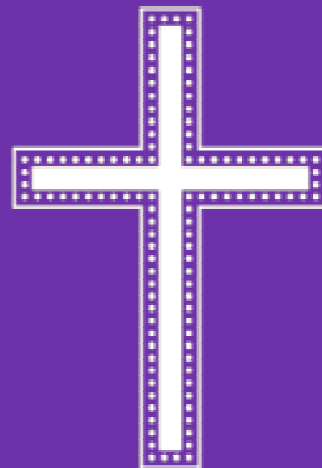


in a week's time, we should have a crop of tasty cress!

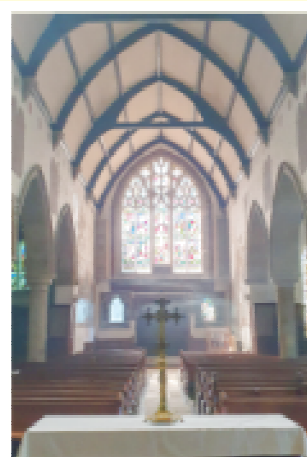
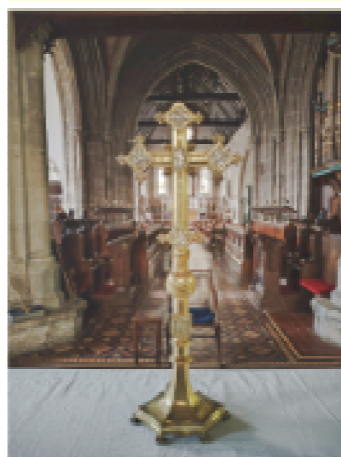

### Sunday 1 February – The Presentation of Christ in the Temple: Luke 2.22-40

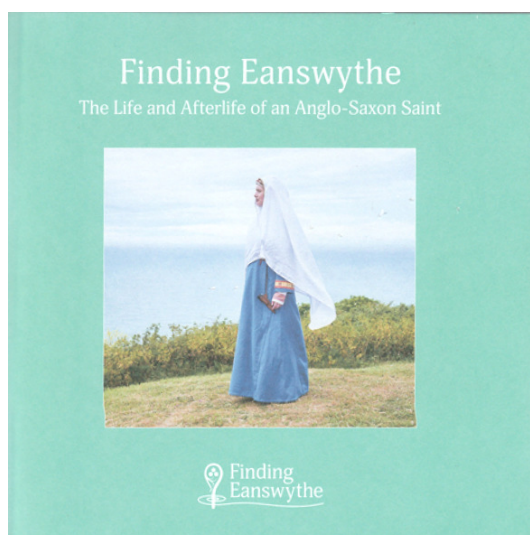

## Finding Eanswythe



Whilst the Finding Eanswythe Project has come to a conclusion, the working group will continue with their research. This book covers the findings over the six-year programme with a series of essays covering such topics as The Legend of St Eanswythe, A Minster in the early Mediaeval Landscape, Minster to Priory, Folkestone and the English Reformation, St Eanswythe's Water, St Eanswythe's Chapel, Matthew Woodward and Eanswythe Found. All by various members of the Research Group.

## Ash Wednesday and Lent

Ash Wednesday falls on 18 February this year and is a holy day of prayer and fasting marking the first day of Lent – forty days of prayer, fasting and abstinence before the arrival of Easter.



At our special Ash Wednesday services we receive ash on our foreheads as the wearing of ashes has been a sign of repentance since biblical times. The imposition of ashes is typically done with the sign of the cross, signifying that the recipient is a follower of Jesus accompanied by these words: “Repent, and believe in the Gospel” or “Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.” The ashes are prepared by burning palm leaves from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebrations.

### Ash Wednesday Collect – used at our Eucharists throughout Lent

Almighty and everlasting God,  
You hate nothing that you have made,  
and forgive the sins of all who are penitent:  
create and make in us new and contrite hearts,  
that we worthily lamenting our sins,  
and acknowledging our wretchedness,  
may receive from you, the God of all mercy,  
perfect remission and forgiveness;  
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

### Additional Lenten Collects

Blessed are you, God of compassion and mercy,  
to you be praise and glory for ever.  
In the darkness of our sin,  
your light breaks forth like the dawn  
and your healing springs up for deliverance.  
As we rejoice in the gift of your saving help,  
sustain us with your bountiful Spirit  
and open our lips to sing your praise.  
Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.  
Blessed be God for ever

Merciful Lord,  
absolve your people from their offences,  
that through your bountiful goodness  
we may all be delivered from the chains of those sins  
which by our frailty we have committed;  
grant this, heavenly Father,  
for Jesus Christ's sake, our blessed Lord and Saviour,  
who is alive and reigns with you,  
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,  
one God, now and for ever.

## On the 40th Day of Christmas .....



..... we mark the Presentation of Christ in The Temple otherwise known as **Candlemas**. The Feast of the Presentation or Purification is one of the oldest feasts of the church. The Gospel of Luke says that Jesus and his parents were met At the Temple by Anna and Simeon. Simeon held the baby Jesus and called him a Light to the World. The pilgrim Egeria recorded how it was celebrated in Jerusalem in the late 4th century:

*‘But certainly the Feast of the Purification is celebrated here with the greatest honour. On this day there is a procession to the Anastasis; all go in procession, and all things are done in order with great joy, just as at Easter. All the priests preach, and also the bishop, always treating of that passage of the Gospel where, on the fortieth day, Joseph and Mary brought the Lord into the Temple, and Simeon and Anna the prophetess, the daughter of Phanuel, saw Him, and of the words which they said when they saw the Lord, and of the offerings which the parents presented. And when all things have been celebrated in order as is customary, the sacrament is administered, and so the people are dismissed.’*



We will read more about Egeria when we mark Good Friday and the tradition of the *Via Crucis* – the way of The Cross.

Egeria was an Hispano-Roman Christian woman, widely regarded to be the author of a detailed account of a pilgrimage to the Holy Land about 382–384. The text is a narrative apparently written at the end of Egeria's journey from notes she took *en route*, and addressed to her 'dear ladies': the women of her spiritual community in Rome.



## Ruth Simpson 12 May 1937 - 6 January 2026

It is with no little sadness that we record the death of Ruth Simpson on 6 January 2026.

Ruth and her late husband John joined the congregation here at St Mary and St Eanswythe in 2000, following John's retirement as Dean of Canterbury Cathedral and their subsequent move to Folkestone. They quickly became valued members of our church family - Ruth becoming a member of the PCC and John assisting Fr David in our worship and ministry.

Ruth was an exceptional lady, of firm opinions and the gift to contribute constructively in groups and at PCC meetings. Her comments were always anticipated with interest and discussions were enhanced by her contributions borne of a wide experience of life as a mother of three and with John in his church life. Amongst her many talents, she was an artist of no mean ability, creating pictures of wildlife and the countryside around her home in France and from her travels around the world with her husband.

Personally, her concern and natural interest in friends' welfare were second to none. The writer of this appreciation has good reason to testify to that gentle but firm support.

May she rest in peace and rise in glory.

## **Bookworm: What Catriona Has Been Reading**

### **Nesting – Roisin O'Donnell (2025)**

Domestic abuse may not be the most appealing subject to read about, but this book reads like a thriller. There is a constant air of menace and impending doom throughout this tension-filled novel, especially when Ryan, Ciara's vindictive and manipulative husband is around.

Ciara is trying to be the best mum she can be while at the same time being subjected to emotional and psychological abuse from her husband (whose jaw clicks when he is angry). It takes her a while to see that she is being coercively controlled and is in an abusive relationship – because Ryan doesn't actually hit her.

Set in Dublin in 2018-2019 this excellent and very credible story addresses domestic abuse and homelessness (I have a professional interest in both topics) as well as families, friendship, love, hope, courage, resilience, Ireland, and how the cards appear to be stacked in favour of men. The book is both insightful and extremely moving, as well as heart-warming, and at times almost heart stopping. It's a very exciting read and I'd have read it in a single sitting if I could.

Long-listed for the Women's Prize for Fiction 2025, I am astounded that it didn't win!

### **The Hawk Is Dead – Peter James (2025)**

This is the latest in the Roy Grace series and as you'd expect from Peter James it's a very good, fast paced read. Ultimately it became unputdownable.

The Royal train is derailed in a tunnel approaching Brighton and then one of Queen Camilla's party is shot by a sniper. All of which is how Detective Superintendent Roy Grace ends up leading the most important and high profile case of his career. Of course nothing is straightforward and it gradually becomes apparent that there are several very bad people working in the Royal Household. Unlike almost everyone else, including the King, Roy Grace is convinced that the Queen was not the intended target, but how can he prove it?

It's an excellent book, with an intricate plot, which I thoroughly enjoyed. There's also lots of fascinating detail about how the Royal Household works, and a high speed chase through the corridors of Buckingham Palace.

Highly recommended.

### **The Red Shore – William Shaw (2025)**

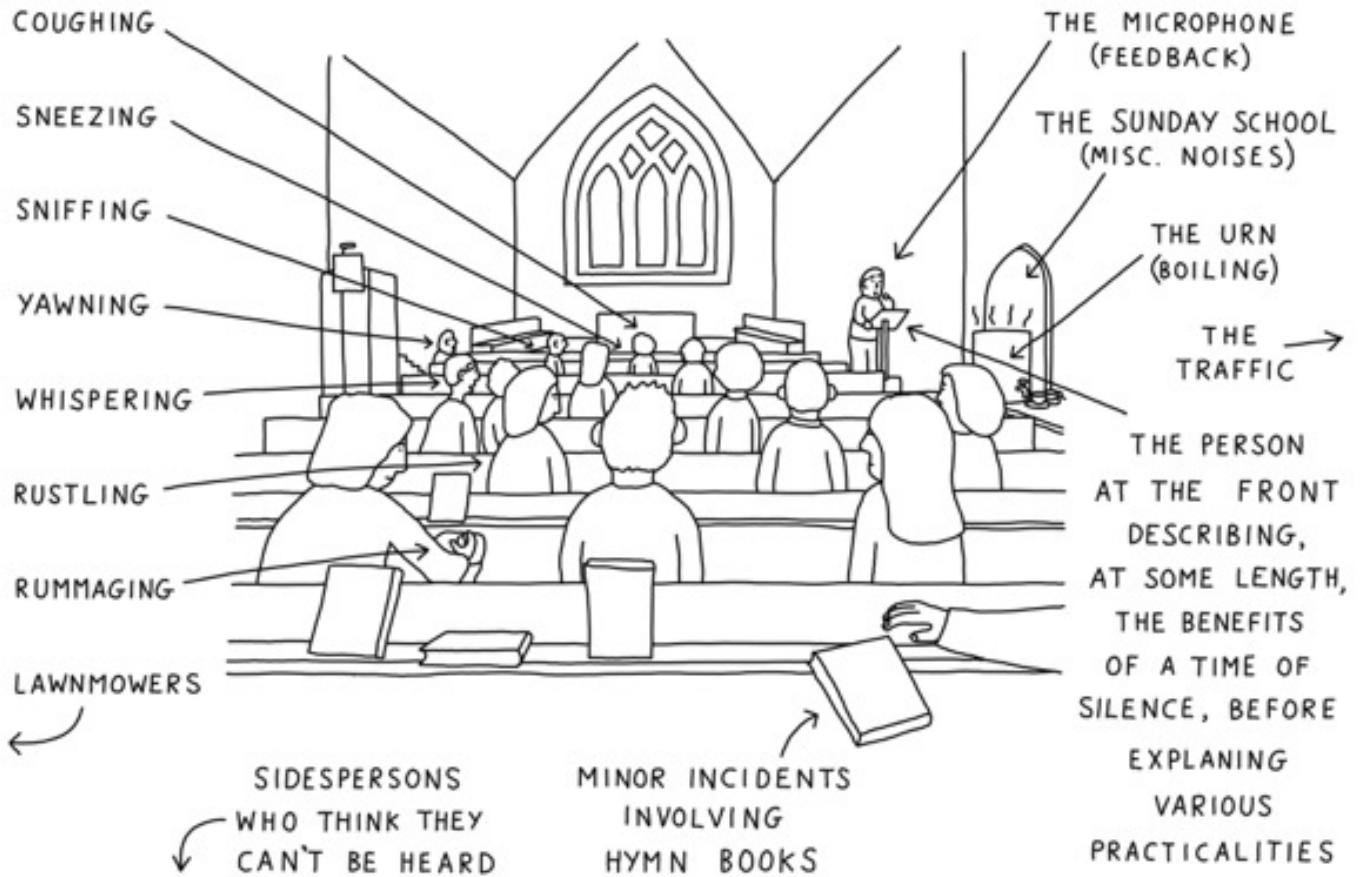
This was such a good book, indeed the second half was unputdownable. Sergeant Eden Driscoll of the Met police is called urgently to Devon where his estranged sister has gone missing on her boat. The authorities believe she has drowned, and Eden finds himself looking after the nine year old nephew he never knew he had. What follows is his investigation into what happened to his sister, something that leads him into great danger, and the discovery that all is not as it first seemed.

It's a very exciting book, with quite a high body count, and the first in a new series set in Devon. I didn't think anything could be as good as William Shaw's Dungeness books, but I was wrong. He just gets better and better. And I can't wait for the next in the series.

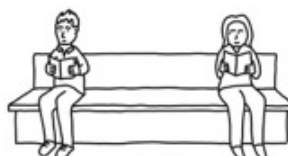

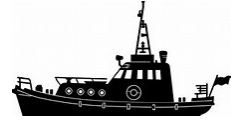

## How well do you know our church?

Last month we were challenged to find a stained glass window depicting both John the Baptist and John the Evangelist. The window is in the west end of the South Aisle and depicts incidents from both their lives and is probably seen to its best advantage in afternoon and evening sunshine. This month's challenge is to find the memorial to **Canon Peter Tindall, vicar here from 1914 to 1927** which carries this inscription:

*'In the years of the Great War, he made this church and parish a home for all who served their king and country.'*



Canon Tindall was also instrumental in the construction of the Calvary at the entrance to the churchyard from Church Street which carried the names of those servicemen from our parish who died in the Great War, later moved to a place of safety in the niche to the right of the Pulpit together with the figure of Christ originally on the cross but vandalised, restored and brought into the church.
